


Knocking down the wall between the two rooms was the obvious solution as it would give the couple a larger space for an open-plan kitchen-diner. Thanks to Ben's background in kitchen design, the couple were able to play around with layouts and ideas on his design software before approaching their builder. 'We had a clear idea of how we wanted the space to look from an early stage,' says Carrie.

Having measured up the kitchen and dining room, Ben drew up the new layout of the room. Luckily, the space proved to be large enough for the kitchen island that both were keen to incorporate into the layout. 'Ben has designed so many kitchens over the years he knows how an island can transform the look and function of a kitchen,' Carrie reveals. 'Not only does it act as a social hub, but it also provides additional storage space – something we definitely needed.'

With the plans finalised, the couple got stuck in and removed the old kitchen and tiles themselves to help keep costs down. 'We managed to sell the old kitchen and range cooker on Ebay, which worked out perfectly as the buyer came to take everything away and it meant we gained some extra cash towards the cost of the remodel,' says Carrie. With help from a builder friend, the couple removed the dividing wall between the kitchen and dining room then

inserted an RSJ to support the new opening. 'This took a little longer than expected as the RSJ had to be clad with a fire-resistant plasterboard to meeting building requirements,' Carrie explains.

With the structural changes completed, Carrie and Ben were able to finalise their choice of kitchen units, worktops and appliances. Keen to go for a sleek, modern look, they settled on a Beeck handleless system with matt grey units. 'We loved the contemporary feel of the design and knew we could mix in more traditional elements elsewhere to stop it from feeling clinical,' says Carrie. 'We replaced the old range cooker with an induction hob to work with the modern units, and the worktops are 12mm Silestone quartz to complete the contemporary look.' With Ben keen to include lots of high-end gadgets, they also fitted a stylish wine cooler into the side of the island, a Quooker boiling water tap by the sink and integrated fridge under the oven.

To unify the different zones within the space, the couple opted for a punchy yellow and grey colour scheme throughout, with vibrant feature walls in the kitchen and dining areas. Carrie also fell in love with some bold geometric floor tiles from Harvey Maria. 'The grey and white colour ties in perfectly with the kitchen, and the pop of pattern contrasts against the minimalist units,' she says. A built-in fireplace in the dining room makes this space feel welcoming in the evenings, while a cosy reading nook in the corner is the perfect spot to sit and chat while either Ben or Carrie is cooking in the kitchen.

To add character, Ben made a set of wall shelves from reclaimed scaffolding boards, which he cut down to size, sanded and then coated with a watered-down stain to let the wood grain show through. 'They add a different colour and texture to the room and mean we have extra storage without the need for bulky wall units,' says Carrie. 'Ben even fitted LED strips to the undersides of the shelves to provide extra lighting for the worktops.'

The whole project has been a positive experience for Carrie and Ben and, although some parts took longer than anticipated, they're thrilled with the end result of the redesign project. 'As with any renovation, there were highs and lows,' says Carrie, 'but we now love spending time in here, entertaining our friends and family.'
